**EXPORTS OF GOLD CONTINUE** 

Shipping Movement Reflected in Firmer Tone of Money Market. Speculation Dull and Colorless Bonds Irregular.

NEW YORK, June 11. — Heaviness appeared in spots in the stock market today. Speculation was as dull and colorless as en recent days. Canadian Pacific was depressed by the statement of gross carnings for the first week of June, revealing a decrease of nearly \$500,000. St. Paul fell behind for a time, owing presumably to disappointment over the slow absorption of the new bonds.
