REBATE FOR NUNS ASSERTED.—The matter of the Benedictine Sisters receiving a rebate of half the freight charges from the Southern Pacific Company for material used in building the Mount Angel Academy was brought up yesterday in the trial of the suit of Edward Killinger to recover \$18,480 from the sisters on his contract to build part of the academy.

DRUM CORPS MAY SEE SALEM FAIR.—The sending of the Sons of Spanish War Veterans' drum corps to Salem for the Cherry fair is being urged and the matter is to be brought to the attention of one of the commercial organizations. The drum corps, 40 strong, is a unique feature and attracted wide attention during Rose Festival parades.

UNIVERSAL RELIGION TOPIC.—Swami Prakashanada gave a lecture yesterday at the Central Library on "Universal Religion." He will speak again on Sunday night at 7:30 Morgan building. The lecture is free. He said that it is impossible to have one creed as there are so many kinds of people, but that by setting aside the trivial details over which dissensions arose, the larger religious life would be realized.

COMMISSION TO INSPECT DAIRIES.—To obtain an idea of the general condition of dairies furnishing milk to Portland, members of the City Commission will go with City Health Officer Marcellus today on an inspection trip to a number of the plants. The trip was arranged by Mayor Albee after the completion of a general inspection made by F. H. Bethel, of the United States bureau of animal industry.

BARN FIRED FIVE TIMES.—For the fifth time since June 2, a fire, supposed to be of incendiary origin, broke out in an old livery stable at 805 Albina in an old livery stable. Engine No. 8 responded to the call and put out the fire before much damage was done. Patrolman Stewart, who investigated the origin of the blaze, thinks that someone is trying to destroy the barn. The structure is owned by Mrs. Anna Herrall, 821 Hood street.

W. C. T. U. TO HOLD INSTITUTE.—At 417 Dekum building the Woman's Christian Temperance Union will hold an institute today. Among the speakers will be Mrs. Henrietta Brown, W. C. T. U. state president, and W. S. U'ren, who will speak on the amendments for proportional representation and abolition of the state senate. There will be a special music.

BRAKEMAN HAS MISAP.—Walter Missinger, a brakeman, on the Southern Pacific Railroad, collided with a corner of the depot roof at Yamhill yesterday. He was climbing to the top of a car. He was brought to Portland and taken to Good Samaritan Hospital. His injuries were not serious.

HOLYWOOD RESTORED TO OWNERS.—Holywood subdivision yesterday was restored to the four Misses Buckman by an order of Circuit Judge McGinn. In the trial of a suit against the J. H. Tipton Company and at the same time Mrs. Helen M. Gerard began to serve her sentence of from one to five years imposed by Judge Kavanaugh. Tipton is already in the Penitentiary serving a sentence of the same duration. The property belonging to the Buckman sisters, and which the Tipton company handled in a way that brought prison sentences on all of the members of the company, is valued at \$50,000.

PAVING DELAY ANGRERS. MR. DIECK'S FAILURE TO START PROCEEDINGS HELD CAUSE. Property Owners Feel Excuses Offered Are Trivial, but Fear Late Efforts Are Fruitless.

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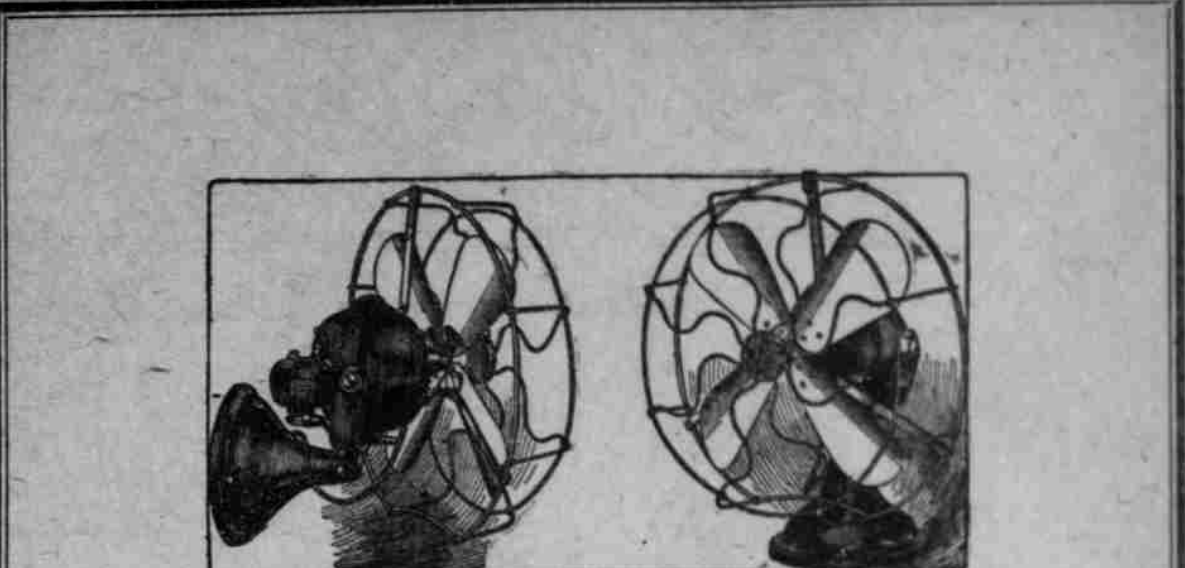
