Commission to Serve Without Pay. 'We, therefore, propose that the Gov-"We, therefore, propose that the Governor appoint a commission of five
persons to serve without pay, to study
the tax laws of Oregon and of other
states and countries and to prepare a
comprehensive and complete tax code
to be presented to the Legislature.
"The tax laws now in force in Oregon are unsatisfactory and insufficient for the needs of the people. The

cient for the needs of the people. He prosperity of the citizens depends largely on a just tax law which will distribute equitably the burden of maintaining the government, and which will provide proper methods of assessment and levies, penalties for delinquencies, etc." Petition Has Five Sections.

The petition which has been flied with the Secretary of State follows: with the Secretary of State follows:
Section I—That the Governor of the State
of Oregon, between January 15, 1915, and
February 15, 1915, appeint a commission
consisting of five persons, citizens and tax
payers of the State of Oregon, who shall
at the times and places required by the
chairman of said commission meet for the
purposes of investigating and inquiring concerning the revenue and tax laws of the
State of Oregon and of other states and
countries.


Section 2—That thereafter, and before the session of the Legislature next following, said commission shall draft a tax code or law, such as in their opinion shall be best state as a whole, and present said law or code to the Legislature which meets next after the appointment of said commission.

Section 5—That said law or code, so prepared, shall be complete and provide for proper, just and equitable assessments for the levying of said taxes, the collection thereof, including the time and manner of payment, penalties for delinquent payments and the sais of property for delinquencies, together with such other provisions as may be proper or expedient in order to make a complete and comprehensive tax law or code shall be presented to said Legislature meeting next thereafter, tegether with such recommendations as said commission may see fit to make.


SECREARY OF TRI-STATE ASSOCIA-TION IS IN PORTLAND.


