PLANT TO BE ENLARGED McKenzie Hatchery to Increase Its Annual Output of Fish.

EUGENE, Or., June 18.—(Special.)— With the final approval of the State Game and Fish Commission, construction was commenced this week upon improvements upon the McKenzie hatchery at Leaburg which will increase its capacity tenfold and will

hatchery at Leaburg which will increase its capacity tenfold and will make it capable of turning out 2,500,000 trout each year.

At present the hatchery is producing approximately 227,000 fish a year. An automobile road runs to the McKenzle headwaters.

The clans upon which work was commenced this week and will be completed during the Summer, involve the excavation of five more ponds. A plant for the manufacture of fish food, with power generated by a small hydro-electric plant, will be erected.

The entire hatchery building will be overhauled and rebuilt, additional tanks will be placed and other equipment added. Other smaller buildings will be erected and the entire grounds improved and heautified.
