BOSTON, June 19 .- Police Inspector Thomas F. Norton was shot fatally today in a sensational revolver battle in attempting to arrest Lawrence Robinson, who is wanted in Grand Rapids, Mich, on charges of murder and robbery. Robinson was taken to a hospital suffering from three bullet wounds. He probably will recover. His companion, Joseph F. Daniels, was locked up on a charge of murder. . Leaping over the body, Robinson darted for the stairway leading up the street. Three shots from the officers' weapons struck him as he reached the steps. Although severely wounded, he emptied his revolver in the direction of the detectives and reached the street, where a mounted policeman over-powered him.

Inside the cafe, meanwhile, the de-tectives had grappled with Daniels and arrested him. Throughout the shooting, while diners sought shelter behind overturned chairs and tables, a young woman planist made a brave effort to play a popular air.
