CARNEGIE LAUDS WILSON

Repeal of Tolls Exemption Coupled With Talk of Peace.

LONDON, June 19.—High tribute was paid President Wilson tonight by Andrew Carnegie, Baron Saxe, of Dunfermline, for his action in obtaining the repeal of the clause in the Panama Canal tolls bill exempting American citizens from the payment of tolls. The speeches were delivered at a dinner held at the National Liberal Club in celebration of the centenary of peace between the English-speaking nations.

MAN ARRESTED IN SEATTLE BELIEVED TO BE R. C. DELANE.

A letter yesterday from the Portland police describing a man who flooded that city with bad checks, also describes a man exactly like Delane. Albert Hess, of the Hess Press, Fourth Avenue and James street, caused Delane's arrest. Delane ordered some checks printed at Hess' place yesterday. They were supposed to be for the C. E. Dickinson Company, an insurance firm in the Hays building, but Delane made the mistake of having them printed "E. C. Dickinson." Hess called up Dickinson, who said he had no checks ordered. Delane was arrested as he was leaving Hess' place this morning. Delane gave Hess a bad check for \$125 for the work. He cashed a check for \$5.00 on the Merchants Cafe, and several other small checks have been reported. He was found to have blank checks on Portland, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle banks.

SEVERAL PRIZES AWARDED

Elaborate Programme Is Presented and Dr. J. R. Wilson, Principal for 25 Years, Makes His Farewell Address.

Forty-eight young men and women, students of Portland Academy, received diplomas and awards for efficient work at the First Presbyterian Church last night. W. M. Ladd, president of the board of trustees, presented the diplomas. The scholarship prizes were awarded by Professor James E. Ewing and were as follows: The Edith Emily Forbes memorial prize of \$15 to the student of the second-year class who attains the highest standing in the work of the first year of the Greek course, to Donald Alexander Skene. The Corbett prizes to the two students attaining the highest averages: First, Antoinette Mears, \$30; second, Richard Milton Bozarth, \$20. The Phillip Selling prize of \$25 to the student attaining the highest scholarship in English to Marguerite Templeton. The Wheeler prize of \$25 to the student solving the highest scholarship in history, to Jesse Lousetan Houck. Mathematics Prize Given. HYLAND FIGHTS DRAW

Former Topnotcher Stays With King of Four-Rounders.

"Fighting Dick," Who Once Knocked Out Cross in 41 Rounds, Proves Big Surprise to Ring Fans.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—(Special.)—Fighting Dick Hyland, one time a topnotcher in the lightweight ranks and the boy who knocked out Leach Cross in 41 rounds at Coffroth's Colma arena, got a draw decision tonight against Sally Salvador, king of the four-rounders. The Sacramento lad unquestionably had a shade over Hyland, but it was a small lead at that, and the decision was well received. Salvador scored on clean-cut punches, but he was largely to blame for the constant clinching. Hyland was forcing the fight every step of the way and, although much of his swinging was wild, he was making Salvador back away and come to many clinches. In the first round Dick put Salvador to the mat with a left to the jaw, after he had been beaten about by Sally at long range. That made Salvador extremely cautious and whenever there was the slightest danger he came in close. Hyland was a surprise, as it was not figured that he had much of a chance. And at that he took Salvador's hardest punches flush on the point and came in for more.
