CHARTER MAY BE TARGET

"Why Work in Dark?" Asks Mayor. "If Present System Is Wrong Let Us All Know It and Get a Better One."

Although backers of the proposed Aleas-Dieck-Brewster recall are still working in the dark, refusing to disclose their identity or to drop any hint that might throw light upon their plans or purposes, it is believed that the recall proposal has been sidetracked for an attack on the compission form of an attack on the commission form of government. While nothing apparently has been disclosed from the mysterious headquarters, roports have been cir-culated to the effect that measures are being prepared, to submit at a coming election, to nullify the commission charter or to put in its place a new

form of government.
Various reports along this line have been circulated. One which has found its way to the City Hall is that the backers of the recall now have petitions

being prepared a new charter, which, if adopted by the people, would amend the present commission charter so as to provide a combination of the commission and the councilmanic forms of government. It is reported that this charter has been in the course of preparation for some time, and may be ready for submission to the people under the initiative, either at a special city election in November or at the regular city election next June, a year hence.
