LIQUOR LICENSES OF GRILL REVOKED

Action by Council Unanimous in Richards Case and Emergency Clause Is Added.

BUSINESS TO BE CONTINUED

Mayor, Receiving Support of Associates in Cleanup Campaign, Expects to Prefer Charges Soon Against Others.

No more drinks can be sold at Richards Grill and barroom. The City Commission, on the strength of testimony heard Thursday afternoon to the effect that the place has not been properly conducted, revoked the liquor licenses yesterday by unanimous vote. A revocation ordinance was passed, with an emergency clause attached, making the revocation effective at once. At the same time another ordinance was passed giving T. I. Richards, proprietor of the place, a refund of the unused part of his licenses, amounting to \$822.16.

An hour after the action of the Coun-

part of his licenses, amounting to \$822.10.

An hour after the action of the Council License Inspector Hutchinson visited the grill and the management surrendered the licenses. Announcement was made later that no attempt will be made to sell any liquor in either the grill or the restaurant or barroom, but that the restaurant will be continued the same as in the past. Mr. Richards says only 23 per cent of his receipts were from liquor, so that he still has a good margin on which to continue his restaurant business.

The action of the Council had been expected. The grill management was not even represented at the Council session. The ordinances were passed without discussion.

The emergency clause reads: "An emergency hereby is declared to exist for the preservation of peace, health and safety of the City of Portland. To protect the morals and welfare of the people of the City of Portland it is necessary to eradicate known places where immorality is practiced and this ordinance is directed to that end. Therefore an emergency is hereby declared and this ordinance shall go into force and effect from and after its passage by the Council."

Mayor Albee, in receiving the unantmous support of the Council in his campaign against this place, announced that he had other places under surveillance and expected to present charges against some others in the near future. That his plan meets with the approval of the rest of the Commission is apparent from the fact that they have upheld him in all cases brought up previously.

The Richards Grill management has no appeal from the action of the Council. The Council, under the liquor laws, has absolute and final power in the matter of granting and revoking

FOR RATE HEARING.

Contention Will Be Terminal Charge to Port Is Impossible Because of Length of Haul Involved.

The railroads will contend that it is a physical and economic impossibility to give Astoria the same rates that apply to Portland and the Puget Sound points. Rates are not fixed, they point out, by the lines of least resistance, but by the shortest actual mileage between given points.

It is the contention of the Astoria interests that Astoria, because of its position on a water grade from the interior, is entitled to rates as low as those applying to Puget Sound. The

those applying to Puget Sound. The rate to Astoria now is 4½ cents a hun-dred pounds higher on grain and cor-respondingly higher on other commodi-ties than to Portland or Puget Sound.
