Cities' Prosperity Depends on Wealth of Country and Number on Lund, Says School's Hend.

The function of the Oregon Agricultural College in developing the state and stimulating realty values was explained in detail at the last Summer meeting of the Portland Real ty Board yesterday by Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of the college.

W. J. Masters, a member of the Board and president of the Portland O. A. C. Club, presided.

"The prosperity of cities like Portland in a large measure is dependent upon the status of the contributing territory," said Dr. Kerr.

"Our experts at the college are fighting the diseases which blight the Oregon fruits. They have, in this way, saved the Oregon farmers millions of dollars. By new methods of agriculture they have shown the Oregon farmer how to increase his crops many fold.
