The latest news received here is that the California is struck fast on the rocks, but is in no immediate danger. She struck with such force that the lower part of her bows was badly crushed.

# CAMPAIGN TO ROUT IOCRATS BEGUN

1912 Convention Leader Has Plan to Reunite Republican Factions.

LETTERS SENT TO VOTERS

Roosevelt Delegate "Manager" Who Refused to Bolt Seeks Pledge From All Opposed to Present Administration

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 25 .- Ormsby McHarg, of New York, who attained considerable prominence at the Republican National envention in Chicago in 1912 as manager of the contests of Roosevelt dalegates, but who, after that convention and the formation of the Bull Moose party in the same city a little later, declined to bolt the Republican party declined to boit the Republican party, is at work on a plan of bringing former Republicans back into the party, on the ground that there must be a reunion in order to terminate Democratic control of the Government. Mr. McHarg is engaged just now in sending letters to voters in all the states, setting forth that he has been asked to organize a movement to accomplish the purposes set forth in a form of pledge which he incloses on a post card. The pledge reads as follows:

lows:
"I favor a movement to reunite in a common cause all of the electors of this state who have heretofore believed in and gained inspiration from the history and principles of the Republican party. I am in favor of inviting all others to join this movement who are opposed to the principles and policies of the Democratic party, as exemplified by the present National and state administrations."

Public Demand Is Found.

Those to whom this pledge is sent are requested to sign and return them if they can consistently do so. In his letter Mr. McHarg says:

"This movement grows out of a public demand for an organization which will fairly and comprehensively formulate and present to the electors of the Nation existing reasons why National and state Democracy, as at present exemplified, should be resisted now, and opposed at the approaching general elections.

"The men comprising this organization will control it and without doubt from time to time they will announce policies and devise plans which have for their purpose the mitigation of existing industrial and political evils.

No Candidacies in Mind.

"It must be clearly understood that this movement is not designed to ad-

"It must be clearly understood that this movement is not designed to advance the candidacy of any man for office nor is it planned for the purpose of opposing or antagonising individuals holding official position within party organisation.

"The Nation has never been in a more critical condition than at the present time. The Government is being attacked from within. An effort is being made to destroy both its form and substance. Socialism, the enemy of representative government, is growing unchecked. Peace at any price and peace without honor is strangling partiotism and National sentiment. These conditions, together with a suicidal industrial policy, have brought about a situation such as existed during the last National Democratic administration when electors of all political beliefs enlisted under the Republican standard to save the country."
