Selection of a successor to Bishop Scadding will be made September 18 by the general convention of this diocess in special session. The selection will be by a majority vote of each house, the clergy and the lay delegates.

In the election no nominations are required and the ballot will be open and will be continued until one candidate receives the majority of votes.

and will be continued until one candidate receives the majority of votes of the two houses concurrently. The ratification of this election must then be made by the house of bishops, reppresenting all of the dioceses of the United States.

Many names are being suggested as possibilities, but all are regarded as speculative. No elected bishop can be considered for the vacancy, aithough a missionary bishop is eligible, according to the law of the Episcopal church.
