Junior Government Candidates Speak on Street Corners.

IMPETUS GIVEN CAMPAIGN

Newsboy and Chapman School Office-Seekers Are Out in Auto Trucks and Draw Crowds—Plea for Support Made to Lodge.

Street campaigning by candidates for offices in the Junior Government took a new impulse last night. Dozens of the young candidates and their friends were out "soap-boxing" from prominent corners in the business section in a correct imitation of the recent primary campaign.

The newsboy ticket was out in force, rolling about town in a big auto truck and stopping at various corners for short speaking programmes.

Chapman school came out again in its big auto truck, manned by F. C. Riggs, and with a "bally-hoo" of friends and well-wishers spoke at the corner of Sixth and Alder and at other prominent points.

Their campaigning was assisted by volunteers from the boys' life and drum corps, whose lusty preliminary racket proved an excellent thing to attract a good-sized crowd on short notice.

Different candidates also spoke at luncheons held in various parts of the city yesterday. Alexander Rae, one of the trustees of the Newsboys' Home, for the benefit of which the campaign is being conducted, joined with other members of the Royal Arcanum and explained the plan and asked support for it.

NEW LAW AFFECTS FIRMS

All but Two Eugene Plants Under Employers' Compensation Act.

EUGENE, Or., June 30.—(Special).—All the Eugene manufacturers, except two, so far as is known here, will come under the provisions of the new workingmen's compensation law, which goes into effect tomorrow. One of these two is a flour mill, the other a newspaper plant.

Nearly every plant in Eugene is willing to come under the new law," said E. J. McClannahan, president of the Lane County Manufacturers' Association, today. "We do not believe that the law is by any means perfect and there are some amendments which we propose to bring before the next Legislature. The present law is good as far as it goes and is better than none at all."

CHIEF HOLMES' PAY STOPPED

Civil Service Board's Order Raises New Issue With Dieck.

Another chapter in the long-drawn-out controversy between Commissioner Dieck and the Municipal Civil Service Board, over the appointment of H. W. Holmes to the position of chief of the City Bureau of Highways and Bridges, was closed today. The board ordered that the salary of Mr. Holmes be stopped until the board has decided whether to confirm his appointment.

PROHIBITION VIEWS ASKED

Letters Are Sent to Nominees for State Senate and House.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 30.—(Special).—A letter has been sent to each nominee for the State Senate and House in Clackamas County, asking his stand on the liquor question.

The letter contains two questions as follows: "Are you in favor of state and national prohibition of the sale and manufacture of intoxicating liquors?" and "If not, what is your view on the subject?"
