SUPPLY IS LARGE AT FUR SALES Unusually Heavy Stock at Latest Auction at London.

The most important fur sales in London are held in the Spring. At the recent sales the stock was larger than usual, chiefly incause the next most important Continental country imported less than its customary supply, reports Consul-General Loop. In all, it is estimated that between 10,000,000 and 12,000,000 skins were sold. On a given day, which was more or less typical, the following skins were sold: 183,000 skunk, 186,000 American opossum, 50,000 raccoons, and 1800 givet cats. The numbers effered differed, of course, from day to day; as many as 330,000 skunk skins were catalogued for sale in one day, and 2,500,000 musquash on anin one day, and 2,500,000 musquash on another. Chicago Wheat Sells at Bottom Price of Season.

MARKET LATER RALLIES

Uneasiness Over Continued Com plaints of Too Much Moisture in Northwest Moves Prices Upward-Coarse Grains Down.

CHICAGO, June 30.—Uneasiness over continued complaints of too much moisture in the Spring group belt railied the wheat market today after prices had fallen to the lowest level yat this season.
