LOG TRAIN VICTIM DIES.—Tony Erch, 24 years old, died from loss of blood yesterday morning at Good Samaritan Hospital, where he had been taken after being run over by a logging train at Kelo, Wash. Erch was employed as a section hand by the Eastern & Western Lumber Company. Tuesday evening, while working on the road, he fell under one of the logging trains, several cars passing over one of his legs. He was immediately brought to Portland and taken to the hospital. The leg was amputated, but during the trip from Kelo he had lost so much blood that he died yesterday morning. A brother, Michael, lives at 781 Harvard street, University Park.

DISTRICT IMPROVEMENT PROPOSED.—The improvement of East Davis and other streets between East Gilsan and the Base Line road, East Eighty-second and East Eighty-seventh street, is proposed, at a cost of \$40,434. The streets to be paved are East Davis from East Eighty-second to Beyr Terrace; East Ash from East Eighty-second to East Eighty-seventh; East Eighty-third, from Base Line road to East Gilsan; East Eighty-fourth from Base Line road to Billinger; East Eighty-fifth from Beyr Terrace to East Gilsan street; East Eighty-sixth from Base Line to East Gilsan; East Eighty-seventh from Base Line to Beyr Terrace; Beyr Terrace from East Eighty-sixth to East Eighty-fourth and Billinger Drive; East Eighty-fifth to East Eighty-seventh street. This district improvement will be grading and cement sidewalks.

LAND FOR BOULEVARD WANTED.—To make possible the completion of a boulevard now under way around the base of Mount Taber Park, City Commissioner Brewster has recommended the purchase of a strip of land 30 feet wide and about 1200 feet long, where park land is not available for the boulevard. The owner, J. Shirley, puts the price at \$800. An ordinance providing for the purchase was presented to the city council yesterday and passed to third reading.
