Life of the habitual drunkard was depicted in detail yesterday before the City Commission at a special hearing for the purpose of considering the revocation of the liquor licenses of the two saloons owned by W. Margulls, on Burnside and Madison streets. The saloons are known as "bottlehouses."

"The Burnside Bottlehouse is the place where the finishing touches are put on a spree," said Police Sergeant Wells. "The reason is the boose is sold there very cheaply. It is an inferior class of whisky and wine, and two or class of whisky and wine, and two or three drinks will put a man out."

"The secret of the success of the Bettlehouse." said Patrolman N. F. Hunt, "is the cheapness of the liquor. You can get four ounces of whisky for 5 cents, where in other salons you

pay 15 cents for one ounce. When a man is out for a drunk he spends his money first in the better places, then goes to the Bottlehouse to put on the last touches. His money generally is low and he goes there because he gets more booze for a nickel. The place on Madison street is frequented by habitual drunkards." "Bartenders Arrested" Says Officer.

Patrolman John Wellbrook said he has arrested the bartenders for selling

iquor to drunken men.
"The persons who frequent the Botlehouse," said Policeman Wellbrook,
would be thrown out of other sa-"would be thrown out of other saloons. The low classes go there because the liquor is cheap. If you'd put a drop of that stuff on a rabbit's togue he would fight a buildog.

"The worst stuff is called 'paint.' One man gets some alcohol and another some of the Bottlehouse wine. They mix it and the best man in the world would fight his best friend. They get out on the street and bark."

Patrolman Leisy suid he has occasion eften to go to the place with the patrol wagon. "Every once in a while," he said, "we back up and haul out a load of drunks. They sleep in chairs and on barrels."

STREETS ARE VACATED


