There was a firm close at 4 2% to 5c net advance. Corn suffered a net loss of 5c to 5c 8c, cats finished 5c off to 1-16 up, and provisions ranging from 2% 25c down to a rise of 7%c.

Unfavorable weather in the Spring crop region had a builled effect on wheat. The opening, which varied from 5c to 5c off to 5c advance, was followed by a material rise all around, though afterward the gain entirely disappeared and July underwent a decided sag. Assertion that the largest yield of wheat ever known in Nobraska was assured counted later against the buils, but reports that black rust was general along the southern edge of South Dakota brought about a rally. about a raily.
