MEAT INSPECTOR NAMED

ARRANGEMENTS MADE TO ENFORCE NEW LAW JULY 10.

Dr. E. E. Chase Appointed by Health Officer and Mr. Stickney Prepares to Put Ordinance in Effect.

Dr. E. E. Chase was appointed meat inspector yesterday by City Health Officer Marcellus and definite arrangements were completed by Chief Meat Inspector Stickney for the strict enforcement July 10 of the new meat inspection ordinance.

One inspector will be assigned to the inspection of the slaughtering-houses within a mile of the city, another to the inspection of meat brought in by boat and train and wagon, and the third to divide his attention between the two places.

Two booths will be established for inspection of meat shipped to the city. One will be on the West Side and the other on the East Side and provision will be made for ample inspection of all meat brought in by boat, by express or in farm wagons. Each carcass will be stamped with an official stamp resembling that used by the Federal inspectors.

The inspector working on the slaughtering houses will start at once to bring about general improvement in conditions. Stickney said that he hopes to have the slaughter houses in sanitary condition within 30 days after July 10. Improvements in equipment and methods will be required and meat will be inspected to as great an extent as possible.

MARKET BOOTHS STOLEN

Montavilla Equipment Is Located in Alley After Search.
