DINGLEY RECOGNIZES WIFE "A Whole Lot Better," Is Way Doctor Styles Patient's Condition. TACOMA, Wash., July 9.—(Special)

"Dingley is a whole lot better today," said Dr. C. P. Gammon at the Tacoma General Hospital.

"After a thorough examination of his body I have found there is a fracture at the base of his skull and that his shoulder blade is broken. One knee is badly ground up, but I haven't done much with that yet. I'm going to wait a while. There is a compound fracture of one leg, where it was badly crushed. The skin is broken there, too. No infection has yet set in. I think I put a stop to that with iodine. I had X-ray pictures taken of Dingley's body, but I wasn't able to tell much from them. They were rather hazy."
