This outside butter is being sold at whole-sale as low as 19½ to 21 cents, against a jobbing price of 25 cents for the best city creamery. Cheese prices are also declining slightly, the Tillamook manufacturers announcing a cut of half a cent a pound vertarday. Outside Product Prevents Storage for Winter Use.
