MEETINGS IN PRODUCING DISTRICTS TO BE CONTINUED.

Efforts to Be Made to Thwart Work of Dry Forces by Argument in Gatherings and Leaflet.

SALEM, Or., July 16 .- (Special.) -- At meeting here today of the executive committee of the Oregon Hopgrowers and Dealers' Association further plans for combatting the movement to make the state "dry" at the November election were made. It was decided to continue public

meetings throughout the hopgrowing section until the election. The next one will be at McMinnville next Saturday, and the following Saturday one probably will be held in Salem. It also was announced that the committee would meet in Portland July 31. Assistant Secretary Bolam, after the meeting today, branded the statements of the prohibition leaders that the growers of Oregon would not suffer if the state voted "dry" as untrue, the state voted dry as untrue, he said, further, if prohibition won here it would be a big factor in carrying states into the "dry" column. The Prohibitionists, he said, would make much capital out of the fact that a large

hoprowing state had voted against the sale and manufacture of intoxicating beverages. Mr. Bolam denied emphatically a report of discord among the members of board and said that all meetings had been harmonious and the work was proceeding satisfactorily.
