All of Saturday and part of yesterday were devoted to mak-ing a careful canvass of the drug stores of Portland and surrounding towns to find where this particular poison was sold. The efforts in this direction, so far have been fruitless.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Johanna Dawson, widow of the dead man, is detained in the County Jali as a material witness to appear before the Coroner's inquest today or temorrow. The jury has been empaneled and will be called together at I P. M. today. Unless all possible views have been exhausted at that time, the jury will adjourn again until Tuesday.

Little additional light was thrown en the mystery surreunding Dawson's death yesterday. A chemical analysis of the contents of his stemach showed strychnine. Another chemist is still working on the lunch which was found in the stove at the Dawson home shortly after the man's death. The results of this analysis have not been made known yet.


