MILITANT WRITES TO KING

Mrs. Pankhurst Reiterates Demand for Interview With Royalty.

LONDON, July 23.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst has written a letter to the King reiterating her demand for a personal interview and declaring that since His Majesty's own initiative invited certain military men, namely Carson, Craik, Dillon and Redmond, to Buckingham Palace, the suffragettes should have an interview.

DRUG VICTIMS DESPERATE

New Law in New York Cuts Off Supplies of Habitués.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 23.—Driven desperate by their inability to purchase heroin, cocaine, morphine and other habit-forming drugs since July 1, when the new state law prohibiting the sale of those drugs became effective, eight victims of drugs, all young men, applied to the police today to be locked up.

YAWL IS ON LONG VOYAGE

Forty-Footer Reaches San Francisco on Way to Toronto.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 23.—(Special)—The 40-foot yawl Iwona, Captain E. V. Zick, early passed through the Golden Gate late today. The little craft sailed from Vancouver, B. C., July 1, got into a heavy blow and had to put back to Noah Bay, and sail from that port July 14.

TRAIN FAILS TO ARRIVE

Engine Trouble, Not Mexican Soldiers, Halt It This Time.

VERA CRUZ, July 23.—The first through passenger train from Mexico City since the occupation of Vera Cruz

by the American forces was due to arrive here at 7 o'clock tonight with many passengers. The train, however, was halted 40 miles from Vera Cruz because of engine trouble. It is expected to arrive here early tomorrow morning.

ZAPATA FORCES WAGE BATTLE

Federal Troops Hastened From Capital as Reinforcements.

MEXICO CITY, July 23.—Fighting around Tlalpam and Xochimilco is still going on. A strong column was dispatched at noon to reinforce the federal troops in the field. These fresh forces, it is believed, will drive the Zapata adherents back into the Ajusco Mountains.

The safety of the capital was further assured today by the arrival of about 4000 federal troops from the city garrisoning the city now number more than 20,000.

Throughout the day federal reinforcements were arriving at Xochimilco. The roads leading from the capital to that town were lined from early until late tonight with federal cavalry and infantry making the 20-mile trip overland.

REFUGEES WEAR OUT WELCOME

British Cruiser Captain Suggests to Mexicans That They Move.

PIERTO MEXICO, July 23.—Owing to repeated complaints concerning lack of accommodation on board the British cruiser Bristol, Captain Fanshaw of the cruiser today formally and somewhat curtly explained to the Mexican politicians gathered about the ship that his presence was not conducive of discipline.

AUSTRIA WARNS SERBIA

Immediate Assurance Demanded That Assassins of Archduke Will Be Promptly Punished.

BEGRRADE, Serbia, July 23.—The Serbian government received tonight a note from the Austro-Hungarian government regarding the relations between the two countries and dealing directly with the assassination at Sarajevo, on June 28, of Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heir to the Austrian throne.

The note reviews relations with Serbia since 1909 and complains that although the Serbian government promised loyalty to the Austro-Hungarian government, it has failed to suppress subversive movements and agitators by the newspapers.

The note also complains that the Serbian government has incited the Serbian people to hatred of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy and contempt for its institutions.

NEW REMEDIES OFFERED

TRACTION MAGNATE, SOCIOLOGISTS, LABOR LEADER, HEARD.

CHICAGO, July 23.—New points of view of the conflict between capital and labor were revealed today to the United States Industrial Commission here by Samuel Insull, traction magnate and manager of many public utilities, John Fitzpatrick, president of the Chicago Federation of Labor; S. F. DeBler, professor of economics in Northwestern University, and Mary McDowell, head of the University of Chicago Settlement.

Komagata's Passengers, Financed by Rich Countryman, Seek to Gain Advertising of British Oppression in India.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 23.—Two Japanese who leaped overboard from the Komagata Maru today in an attempt to reach British Columbia soil, while the vessel was stemming to sea, were saved from drowning by the Canadian cruiser Rainbow.

The Japanese members of the Komagata Maru's crew, leaped overboard while the vessel was stemming through Plumper's Pass and were caught by a tidal current. The Japanese had their clothes strapped on their backs and wore bathing suits.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 23.—The Japanese steamer Komagata Maru, which carried 352 Sikhs aboard, sailed at 5:30 A. M. today for Shanghai. After a night of threatened trouble, the departure of the Komagata was accompanied by the Canadian cruiser Rainbow, which will escort the Japanese vessel to a point 70 miles west of Vancouver Island.

The Canadian government spent more than \$10,000 in provisioning the Komagata for the return voyage.

BOMBS START TWO FIRES
