DEATH WILL BE PROBED

GRAND JURY TO INVESTIGATE DAWSON POISONING CASE. Peculiar Circumstances Result in Widow Being Detained, but Authorities Have Little Evidence.

The grand jury will investigate the circumstances of the death of George S. Dawson, who died last week from strychnine poisoning, Deputy District Attorney Ryan said yesterday.

It is due to the peculiar and mysterious circumstances surrounding the death that Mrs. Dawson is being held in custody by the coroner's jury.

The grand jury will convene August 2 and all the evidence in this case will be submitted to it.

COUNTY SHIES AT ROAD

WASHINGTON TO SPEND BUT \$2000 ON REX-TIGARD STRETCH. Highway Commission and Portland Auto Club Furnish Most of Fund to Build Macadam Line.

HILLSBORO, Or., July 23.—(Special.)—Washington County "will have nothing to do with the improvement of the Rex-Tigard road running through the southeastern portion of the county, with the exception that the work must conform to the set grades.
