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Chicago Market Suffers From Severe Setback.

PRICES WEAK AT CLOSE

Losses for Day Range From 3 5-8 to 4 3-8 Cents-No Failures Result From Tuesday's Advance. Coarse Grains Are Weak.

CHICAGO, July 29.—Apparently increasing chances that, after all, the war might be narrowed down and prove brief tended to give the wheat market today a sharp setback instead of another stunning advance. No failures developed from yesterday's rise of nearly 10c, even among the smallest traders. In consequence, weakness rather than feverish strength characterized the close, with final values at virtually the lowest point of the day and 3% to 4% of from last night.

Tumbling prices for wheat in the first few minutes went to an extreme of 4%c. Violent reactions ensued, but in no case exceeded 2th cents from the bottom of the opening range.

Corn lurched downward with wheat without, however, suffering any unusual break.
