

BOY OFFICIALS ARE IN

JUNIOR GOVERNMENT TAKES CONTROL OF CITY.

Inauguration Ceremony is Held in Council Chamber, With Mayor and Commissioners Present.

HENRY KNITTEL BURIED

Prominent Hoggrower in Sherwood District Laid to Last Rest.

SHERWOOD, Or., July 29.—(Special.)—The funeral of Henry Knittel, who died at his home at Middleton, one mile from Sherwood, Sunday night, was held yesterday. Mr. Knittel was born in Germany, April 20, 1884. On coming to the United States he made his home for a time in the Central States, for the greater part at Chicago. He came to Oregon 25 years ago and settled in this vicinity, where he has been a prominent hoggrower. Twelve years ago he was married to Mrs. Anna D. Fischer, who survives him.

WALLA WALLA FAIR TO GET BUFFALO.

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Portland now has a change of administration in the junior government. All the new officials are pledged to do their duty regardless of whom it hits or what the results may be. Honesty is to be the by-word in handling the affairs of government and everybody is to get a square deal. The inauguration of the Boy Mayor, the Boy Commissioners and all the other boy city officials took place in the City Council chamber at the City Hall yesterday afternoon. It was a pompous affair, the youngsters behaving themselves with all the dignity of real officials. The ceremony was conducted by the Order of Muts and attracted many spectators. The real Mayor and City Commissioners would have had a difficult time making a more pleasing appearance or better speeches than the junior officials. From first to last they outlined policies and plans which showed they have been following the trend of municipal affairs. The inauguration was started by a selection by Webber's Junior Orchestra, comprising a number of boys and girls with stringed instruments. The junior officials then marched in and took their places, the Boy Mayor, Eugene Rich, being given the real Mayor's place in the chamber. Members of the commission took the places usually occupied by the senior commissioners. Mayor Rich outlined his policy as one of honesty and integrity. He said he believed that policy would answer all his purposes. He was given some advice by "Highbinder" Strandberg, of the Muts, after which the last executive took charge of the meeting. The new officers, one by one, expounded their policies in catchy little speeches which brought great applause and laughter. After the ceremony the whole official family, including Mayor Albee, the boy officials and real city officials, sat at the Council chamber and posed for the official picture.
