

GREAT BRITAIN IN DEADLY EARNEST

\$500,000,000 Added to War Budget and Army Increase Is Granted.

LONG STRUGGLE IN SIGHT

Admiralty Notices Public First News of Navy May Not Be Good News and No Illusions as to Outcome Are Fostered.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—11:50 P. M.—The passage of a war budget for \$500,000,000 in the House of Commons today without a dissenting voice and the granting of an army increase of 500,000 men, in accordance with the plan of Lord Kitchener, the new Minister of War, shows that Great Britain is in deadly earnest.

A call to arms issued by the War Office tonight says an addition of 100,000 men to the regular army is needed immediately, and that "Lord Kitchener is confident this appeal will at once be responded to by all who have the safety of our empire at heart."

Age Limit Is 19 to 30.

The term of service for the new men is to be three years, or until the war is ended. The age of enlistment will be between 19 and 30.

The naval estimates provide for 67,000 additional officers and men, which will make the navy's strength 218,000 men.

There are no illusions in England that the war is certain to be a long and decisive one. The people are steered for a long and exhaustive struggle.

The Admiralty notified the public tonight that the first news from the navy might not be good news. Swift upon the heels of this intimation came the tidings that the cruiser Amphion had been sunk by a mine, with a loss of an officer and 130 men—Great Britain's first sacrifice to the war.

It is considered that British ships in the North Sea are running greater risks during the first days of the war.

The royal family shares with the homes of its many subjects the suspense of waiting for news of the fate of the different units of the fleet. Prince Albert the Second, son of the King, aboard the battleship Collingwood, is one of the many boy midshipmen afloat sharing the perils of their elders.

Fend Is Buried.

There was a dramatic incident in the House of Commons when the feud between Lord Charles Beresford and Winston Spencer Churchill, the First Lord of the Admiralty, was buried. Admiral Beresford shook hands with the First Lord and said:

"Well done."

The torpedo-boat destroyer Lance, which sent the Hamburg-American line steamer Koenigsluise to the bottom with four shots, only came out of the shipyard last Saturday.

Londoners had the first realization of war brought home to them tonight when hundreds of commuters who were taking their trains at the Victoria station were surprised to see \$5 German prisoners guarded by a file of the West Kent regiment with fixed bayonets.

The Germans were naval reservists who had been taken from their ships and made prisoners of war. A goodly number of naval reservists and also some German army reservists, who were attempting to proceed to Germany were gathered in by the authorities today.

Some persons in the crowd in the station, thinking the Germans spies, began to hiss them. The demonstration was quickly silenced by cries of "shame."

The Germans seemed wholly reconciled to their fate and on the best terms with their captors.

Several more persons supposed to be spies were arrested today in different parts of England.

JAPS EYE GERMANY'S FORT

Attack on Tsing-Tau by 10,000 Planned, Says Official.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 6.—An official of the Japanese consulate said today upon receipt of the first official news of the beginning of the clash of arms between England and Germany, Japan would send a fleet of 10,000 men to attack Tsing-Tau and 10,000 more to relieve the British garrisons at Tientsin and Peking. Preparations for such action are now under way, he said.

Two British regiments, the Gloucestershire and the South Wales Borderers, stationed at Tientsin, have been ordered south. They are awaiting the arrival of transports. An Indian regiment of Punjab will remain at Tientsin.

Reports that revolutionaries in China are showing signs of activity focus attention in Tokyo, Japanese officials say. It is feared there the European war will inspire an outbreak in China.

German officials at Tokyo today report that Germans had seized merchantmen in the Yellow Sea.

SHIP SALE LEGAL, IS VIEW

Neutrality Not Violated in Submarine Matter, Says Attorney.

There has been no violation of neutrality through the purchase of two submarines at Seattle, built for the Chilean government, by the Canadian government, as the sale took place in advance of the proclamation of President Wilson, which was made public Wednesday, according to W. C. Bristol, a Portland attorney.

Mr. Bristol says the Canadian government, while virtually under the rule of Great Britain, is independent in a way, and can purchase vessels or other war equipment where she sees fit, but had the sale been consummated with Americans having part, after President Wilson's proclamation, the law would have been violated.

\$126,000,000 USED SO FAR

Nine Cities Take Currency Under Aldrich-Vreeland Act.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Only about \$126,000,000 of additional currency under the Aldrich-Vreeland law has been shipped to the sub-treasuries of the country since the Government decided to aid the banks of the Nation in the emergency created by the European war, according to a statement made tonight by the Controller of the Currency. Amounts taken were:

New York, \$45,502,500; Chicago, \$25,637,010; San Francisco, \$13,408,000; Boston, \$12,045,000; Philadelphia, \$9,300,000; St. Louis, \$8,491,700; Baltimore, \$1,935,000; Cincinnati, \$5,950,000; and New Orleans, \$2,163,600.

WARRIORS ARE NEAR

German, English and Japanese Warships Off Coast.

RAINBOW STEAMS SOUTH

Men-o'-War Now Off West Coast of United States Not of First Class but Engagement Is Fear of Shippers.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 6.—(Special).—Six ships of war, flying the flags of Germany, England and Japan, are drawing together somewhere off the Pacific Coast and reports of a naval battle between these battleships are momentarily expected here. Shipping circles are alarmed for the safety of merchant ships which are now on the Pacific waters.

Word was received here this morning that the German cruiser Leipzig left Maxatlan on the evening of August 5, with all lights extinguished and under forced draft. The destination of the cruiser is not known, but it is believed that the vessel set out to meet the German cruiser Nürnberg, which is said to be headed for the main coast.

Rainbow Steams South.

The British cruiser Rainbow, which has been stationed at Esquimaux naval station, is reported today to be steaming south. This cruiser is armored and is the best equipped English warship on this coast. The British ships of war Shearwater and Algerine left San Diego Monday and it is believed that they will be joined in the course of a day by the Rainbow. The Shearwater and Algerine are antique vessels. The Japanese cruiser Idzuma is reported off the Mexican coast and it is believed that if the German cruisers Leipzig and Nürnberg attack the small English war vessels, the Idzuma will take a hand in the conflict against the German cruisers. The Idzuma carries the heaviest armament of the group. No wireless messages have been received here in the last few days from any of the trans-Pacific steamers, which are nearly all sailing under the British flag, and it is believed that the captains of the vessels have heard of the German cruisers being in the vicinity and have refrained from sending out any reports for fear that their vessels will be seized. Two Oriental liners are due to arrive here tomorrow.

1200 REFUGEES SAIL HOME

American Tourists Leave for New York From Copenhagen.

COPENHAGEN, via London, Aug. 6, 8:30 P. M.—Twelve hundred American tourists who found it impossible to reach home by way of Hamburg sailed from here today on the Danish-American liner United States direct for New York.

Prince Aage, of Denmark, son of Prince Waldemar, whose marriage last January to Countess Calvi Bergoglio of Turin caused his partial estrangement from the King, was arrested a day or two ago as a spy on the German frontier. Subsequently he was released and is now on his way to England.

On the War Minister's behalf the Premier asked the House to consent to this.

COTTON ALARM SCOUTED

UNITED STATES CAN USE ENTIRE SUPPLY, SAYS BANKER.

A. Barton Hepburn Telegraphs Congress That Nation Has Best Chance to Hold Trade.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—A. Barton Hepburn, chairman of the board of directors of the Chase National Bank, has sent the following telegram to Representative Underwood at Washington:

"The South unnecessarily alarmed over the prospective reduction in the demand for and the price of cotton, in view of the general European war. European manufacturers may not require the usual amount of cotton, but American manufacturers will require it all.

"It is inevitable that all over-sea trade of Germany will be at the mercy of any nation which first seeks it and can best serve the former patrons of Germany. Of all nations the United States is in the best position to take and hold the trade. Merchants, manufacturers, bankers and statesmen should work together for that purpose.

"First, liberate our shipping laws. Germany supplied the coarse and cheaper cotton trade of Mexico and Central and South America. Africa, Asia and the Orient get second-class cotton. There will no embargo on the commerce of the Pacific. Our cotton should go abroad, not as raw material, but as a finished product, and the Lord of Europe is over we should hold largely the trade that now is waiting to fall into our hands."

ELITE IN SECOND CLASS

DUCHESS OF MARLBOROUGH AND OTHERS HUMILIATED.

Rich and Titled Persons Must Occupy Poorer Quarters to Reach England by Steamer.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—(Special).—The hardship of war will oblige the Duchess of Marlborough and other titled and wealthy persons to travel second-class to reach England. The Duchess will leave on board the St. Paul of the American line tomorrow.

Several months ago the American line abolished all first and third cabins, leaving only second-class and steerage.

Afraid to attempt the perilous trip across the Atlantic on board any of the vessels flying flags of the warring nations, those who leave tomorrow decided they would prefer to suffer the inconvenience of going second cabin, with the certainty of reaching their homes.

Kelso Young Man Drowns.

KELOSO, Wash., Aug. 6.—(Special).—John Baum, aged 24, was drowned in the waters of Mulholland creek, about 20 miles up the Cowlitz from this place, when he slipped from a boulder and went into a deep hole. Although he was a good swimmer, he was unable to get out, and the other men could not assist him, as the undertow from the creek, which had just been flooded from the dam, was great.

COLUSA IS DUE NEXT WEEK

British Mariner Known Here Carries Coal to German Cruiser.

Word comes from Tacoma that the Grace liner Colusia due to start loading flour there today after having been drydocked at Seattle. The vessel will be here about Monday to take on more freight for ports along the West Coast of South America.

GUARD OVER WIRELESS

NAVAL OFFICERS SENT FIRST TO SAYVILLE, L. I.

Secretary Daniels Ordered by President to Place Censors at All Stations to Assure Neutrality.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Naval officers were ordered today to Sayville, L. I., to supervise the sending of wireless messages at the station there pursuant to President Wilson's order prohibiting radio stations within the jurisdiction of the United States from receiving or transmitting messages of an "unneutral nature" from any of the warring European nations. Enforcement of the order had been delegated to Secretary Daniels of the Navy Department, who decided to place naval officers at all radio stations to act as censors.

WESTERN PACIFIC WARNED

Denver & Rio Grande Chafes Over Paying Its Interest.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Directors of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad ordered today payment of semi-annual interest of 2½ per cent on the first mortgage bonds of the Western Pacific Railway Company, which it controls.

Earnings of Western Pacific were not sufficient to meet the amount required, but the Denver & Rio Grande directors voted to make up the deficit.

In a statement explaining their action the directors said that if the Denver & Rio Grande directors refused to support the Western Pacific some plan of readjusting the latter's finances and general relations with the controlling road must be devised.

FINANCIAL EASE REPORTED

Bankers Expect Resumption of Business on Normal Basis in Few Days.

The Portland Clearing-House Association met just long enough yesterday for its members to say hello to each other, and adjourn indefinitely. The next meeting is subject to call of President Mills.

With business fast resuming its normal proportions and all news from other financial centers of the most reassuring nature, there was nothing for the meeting to do. One telegram from St. Paul, received by President Mills, was to the effect that the money market in the financial situation was so much eased off that in a few days business in St. Paul and the country in general would be entirely normal.

NAVAL OFFICERS SENT FIRST TO SAYVILLE, L. I.
