GAS FRANCHISE GRANTED Clackamas Allows Mains on Road

Running to Oswego.

OREGON CITY, Or., Aug. 7 .- (Special.)-The franchise of the Clackamas County Gas Company to lay mains on the WhiteHouse road to Oswego was granted by the County Court today. The company, which is laying a main from Portland to Oregon City, plans to

build a line across the river below Milwaukie to Oswego and then back again above the town on the east bank. The action is the result of the dispute with the Milwaukle Council over the proposed rate for gas. The Council wanted a price of \$1 a thousand feet
