BROOKES' FORM GREAT, TOO

National Champion Compelled to Play 1 Hour and 30 Minutes Before Landing First Set at 17-15-Second, Third Easier.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 13 .- The opening matches in the contest between the United States and Australasia for the possession of the Davis cup, emblematic of the world's tennis championship, played here this afternoon, resulted in one victory and one defeat for

each nation.

Anthony F. Wilding, of the challenging team, defeated R. Norris Williams II. of America, defender, in straight sets, 7-5, 6-2, 6-3. Not the least disturbed by the defeat of his teammate, Maurice E. McLoughlin evened the day's score by defeating Norman E. Brookes, captain of the Australasian quartet and considered the world's master at tennis, in three stirring sets, by scores of 17-15, 6-3, 6-3. each nation.

Match Thrills 13,000 People.

The Brookes-McLoughlin match marked a history-making epoch in the court sport and thrilled the 13,000 spectators to a point seldom reached in racquet battles. For one hour and 20 minutes these two masters of the game battled through the first set under a broiling sun before Brockes was forced to acknowledge that at Hist he had met his superior in skill and endurance.
