The Monmouthshire was ordered to remain at Yokohama on her arrival soon after the declaration of war be-tween Germany and Great Britain, and while she was reported to have sailed across the ocean two weeks ago, it was found incorrect. The departure of the liner Saturday is taken to indicate that it was generally believed at London then that Germany would not accede to the Japanese ultimatum and with every reason to expect Japanese naval vessels to become active along the Nip-ponese Coast, it was regarded safe to dispatch the Monmouthshire.
