

POINCARÉ REACHES HIS NEW CAPITAL

Ambassador Herrick Remains in Paris to Look After Americans There.

OTHER DIPLOMATS LEAVE

Immense System of Entrenchments Being Constructed—City Is Placed, but People Are Preparing for Eventualities.

BORDEAUX, France, Sept. 2.—President Poincaré and the members of the French Cabinet arrived here today and were greeted by immense and cheering crowds.

President Poincaré has taken a residence in the Prefecture. The Ministry of War is located in one of the buildings of the University of Bordeaux.

The hotels, boarding-houses and private homes are overcrowded with the new arrivals, who include officials of various grades, numbering probably 8000.

PARIS, Sept. 3.—It is officially announced that General Gallieni, commander of the army defending the city, today issued the following proclamation to the inhabitants of Paris.

Entrenchments Being Constructed. An immense and complicated system of entrenchments is being constructed outside the city.

The diplomatic corps, excepting the embassy of the United States, accompanies the government to Bordeaux.

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People Are Calm. The population of the capital is taking the departure of the heads of the government calmly, recognizing that it is a matter of prudence.

Although the city generally is placid, the people feel keenly the approach of the German army, and they are rapidly preparing for whatever may happen.

Military Secrets Closely Guarded. Military secrets are being so well guarded that all reference to them is largely speculation; but it is reasonable supposition that General Joffre prefers to keep his army in the dark.

WAR OFFICE REPORTS PRECAUTIONS. In an official statement issued today the War Office says:

There has been no contact with the German forces in the region of Compiègne and Salines since yesterday. Precautions have been taken to stop any offensive movement of the enemy.

Canada Takes Precaution. Shipping Reports Suppressed on Intimation Germany Is Informed.

MONTREAL, Sept. 3.—For the first time since war was declared, the government signal station has been ordered by the censor to suppress all reports as to shipping coming into or going out of the St. Lawrence River.

AERIAL BATTLE PREDICTED. American Engineers Say German Flying Station Prepares.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—Two American oil engineers, who have reached London from Rumania via Budapest and Berlin, bring interesting stories of the scenes they saw on their trip.

VENGEANCE TAKEN ON PEOPLE OF LIEGE. Students Say Single Shot Would Be Signal to Destroy Whole Street.

MANY VILLAGERS SLAIN. Epidemic of Suicide Among Officers and Men Left to Garrison. Town Attributed to Nervous Prostration.

PARIS, Sept. 3.—(Special)—Two American students who were at the University of Liege at the opening of hostilities and who have arrived here from Lausanne, Switzerland, give a vivid account of the first coming of the Germans and the ensuing siege.

WAR PAID OUT OF SURPLUS. Japan Neither to Increase Taxes Nor Float New Loans.

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—A cable to the East and West News Bureau today from Tokyo says that at the conference of local Governors today, the Minister of Finance said that the special appropriation for war purposes to be submitted to the special session of the Diet would be \$5,000,000 yen (\$24,500,000).

WIRELESS LIMIT IS OFF

BRYAN PERMITS NEUTRAL MESSAGES IN CIPHER.

Censors to Be Provided With Codes—Tuckerton and Sayville Open on Equal Terms.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—Secretary Bryan today announced that the question of the use of wireless by European belligerent powers had been settled by an arrangement, through which all of the powers would be permitted to send and receive messages in code or cipher.

The American censors will be provided with copies of code and cipher books, so as to be in a position to determine that the neutrality of the United States is not violated.

As yet the Department of Commerce has not granted the license applied for by the Tuckerton company and the German government has employed counsels to pursue the application.

SPY SUSPECT AID ASKED. SAN FRANCISCO CHAMBER PROTESTS VON HORST'S ARREST.

Men Held in England Declared American Citizens—State Department Investigates.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—(Special)—Telegraphic protests to the State Department from C. E. Michaels, president of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, against the arrest and detention in London of Baron Louis von Horst, known in San Francisco as Louis Horst, arrived here today.

Baron von Horst is charged by the English authorities with espionage and is held as a prisoner of war in one of the detention camps.

Representative Kahn, who also received a wire from Michaels, took the matter up with the State Department, which cabled to the American Embassy in London to investigate von Horst's arrest.

TOUR PLANS UNCHANGED. WAR MAKES NO DIFFERENCE IN MACMASTER'S ARRANGEMENTS.

Portland Man Tells of Incidents at Outbreak of Hostilities and Praises England's Attitude.

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—(Special)—Four Portland people, Mr. and Mrs. William MacMaster, and daughters, Misses Malsie and Ailsa, arrived in New York from Liverpool on the White Star Liner Adriatic recently.

AMERICA GETS 3 SHIPS. Robert Dollar, of San Francisco, Registered Under New Law.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—The British steamer Robert Dollar, which sails from San Francisco, now at Rio Janeiro, is one of the three foreign vessels which are the first to have been placed under the American flag under the new shipping register law.

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There were 125,000 Belgians before the town August 4, while 25,000 Belgians had been added to the garrisons of the defending forts. The first of the enemy to appear was a swarm of cavalry, protected by a large force of artillery.

This continued until August 7, when, in the course of an armistice arranged for receiving and replying to a summons for surrender and for the burial of the German dead, 20,000 Germans made a sudden dash between forts and entered the town.

Cuban Consul Killed. The bombardment destroyed a large number of houses and the Cuban Consul, a neighbor of the narrator, was killed in his room in the presence of his two children.

Congress to Meet Today in Joint Session to Receive Views—Few Commodities to Bear Burden.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—Congress will meet in joint session tomorrow to hear President Wilson's message asking for a war tax revenue measure that will provide \$100,000,000.

OLD PAVING CASE ENDED. Patullo Avenue Property-Owners, Vancouver, Must Pay.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 3.—(Special)—Property owners along Patullo avenue will be compelled to pay full price for sidewalks and curbs, according to a ruling of the Superior Court in the case of Herman Mueller and wife against the City of Vancouver and S. P. White & Son, contractors.
