Dr. Hinson Declares Gigantic Struggle Unjustifiable.

"WAR LORD" IS CRITICISED

White Temple Pastor Says It Is Duty of Americans to Demonstrate That Healing Is Heavier Than Hurting.

"The present war is the disgrace of the world," declared Rev. W. B. Hinson, in his sermon at the White Temple.

"For animals behaving thus there would be administered correction; for children who misbehave, punishment; but for nations who are warring, there is no punishment."

The preacher contended that the conception of God in the minds and hearts of the leaders, who have precipitated the war and the people who are pursuing it, is small and inadequate.

"The great war in Europe among the so-called Christian nations does not argue the failure of Christianity, because in many places Christianity has never yet been truly tried or applied."

"The real cause of this frightful conflict that bids fair to be known as history's page as 'The War,' is discovered to be deeper than the material causes for which it is being fought."

"Fair was the world when it emerged from the workshop of the eternal; yet 1600 years ago an apostle declared that the whole creation had been so cursed by man's sin that it groaned as in pain."

"Yet America by steadfast purpose and lofty ideals seeks to lighten the nations with the things that make for peace and brotherhood."
