The decision in this case, Mr. LaRoche reports, settled the question of ownership of the land in favor of the upland or

Title Is With State "The court in this case holds," reads Mr. LaRoche's opinion, "that the acts of the Legislature of 1874 and 1876 granted and confirmed the title of the state to the lands lying between high water and low water in the Willamette River to the upland owners.
