Strode, five acres on Powell Valley road, near Forty-third street, for \$10,000; by the Fred A. Johnson company, 9.45 acres on East Forty-third and Hoyt streets, adjoining Laurelhurst, for \$40,000; and by Goddard & Wiedrick, 8.47 acres on East Forty-seventh street, for \$14,000.

INJURED WORKER AWARDED \$1750.—Damages amounting to \$1750 were awarded Marie Gale yesterday by a jury in Judge McGinnis' department of Circuit Court. She sued the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company for \$35,000 for injuries alleged to have been received on an Oregon City streetcar last winter.

MORE AUTO FIRE APPARATUS ORDERED.—Portland is to have more automobile fire apparatus. The City Commission authorized Purchasing Agent Wood yesterday to advertise for bids for a motor ladder truck, a motor truck, a motor and a three-tank chemical truck, the former to cost \$6660 and the latter \$8300. The service truck will be used in place of the horse-drawn ladder trucks. It will be much on the same order as the big white aerial truck now in the service, but will not be nearly as large and will have detachable ladders. The chemical truck will have three tanks for chemicals, one holding 10 gallons and two holding 80 gallons each.
