Taking the stand that the city is paying too high a rental for use of the upper deck of the railroad bridge owned by the O.-W. R. & N. Company, the City Commission yesterday turned down a plan to renew a contract for use of the bridge during the next two years at the same rate as has been paid during the last two years.

A conference of the City Commission, the Board of County Commissioners and officials of the railway company was held yesterday. For reasons not explained the County Commissioners and the railroad officials did not appear.

The Council decided to offer \$18,000 a year for use of the bridge and force the company to bear the cost of maintenance and operation. At present the city pays \$44,000 a year and all the cost of operation and maintenance and assumes responsibility for accidents or damages.

A report was presented to the Council by City Attorney LaRoche, showing that when the company got permission from the Port of Portland and the War Department to erect the bridge the upper or street deck had to be made a part of the structure.

The company was allowed to charge a rental amounting to not more than per cent of the cost of the use of the deck or to charge a toll for use of the bridge, which toll would be fixed by the County court.

Commissioner Daly made a motion to offer \$20,000 for the use of the bridge. Commissioner Dick moved an amendment to cut the rental to be offered to \$18,000, or \$1800 a month. This motion carried by unanimous vote.

NEW SOCIETY HEAD NAMED

Runo Elmer Arne Will Take Charge State's Juvenile Wards. Runo Elmer Arne has been appointed superintendent of the State's Juvenile Aid Society to succeed the late William T. Gardner. Mr. Arne lately resigned an assistant at the City Board of Charities and in Council affairs. He has been notified by letter of his appointment by Secretary F. E. Beach of the board of trustees.

Mr. Arne, although a young man, has had much experience in work of this nature in various cities of the country. He is considered eminently qualified for the position by the trustees of the organization and a telegram is expected from him within a few days accepting the appointment.
