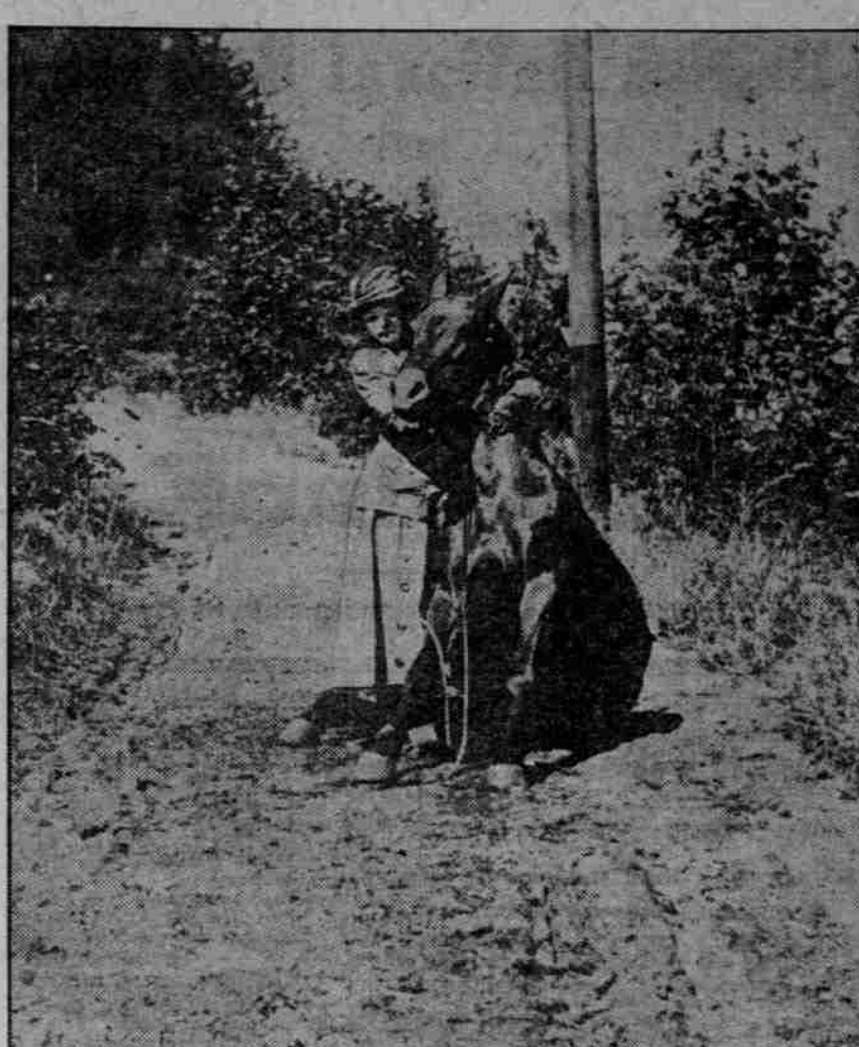
Gus Fisher climbed the matinee in the eighth when he batted a two-bagger against the right-field fence and started another two-run procession.
