CHARGES AGAINST AGGIE ATH-LETIC DIRECTOR FALSE.

Investigation Committee Head Says No Action Bordering On Professionalism Was Shown by Inquiry.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COL-LEGE, Corvallis, Or., Sept. 27 .- (Special.) - The culmination of a thorough investigation of the athletic department of the Oregon Agricultural College was reached at a meeting of the student body held here this morning when Professor E. J. Krause, chairman of the investigating committee, vindivated Dr. gating committee, vindivated Dr. E. J. Stewart, director of athletics, and declared that rumors circulated relative to the morality and honesty of the head of the department of athletics were groundless without ex-

ception.

The committee, composed of prominent faculty men and students, was appointed last Spring by President W. J. Kerr. An element unfriendly to Dr. Stewart had hinted that athletics were tinged with professionalism. The committee's investigation failed to show an instance where athletes had been paid to come to the college, or other action taken that bordered on professionalism.
