Hammond, commander of the Oregon Coast Artillery Corps, O. N. G., returned last night from a 10,000-mile circuit of the United States covering

He was in Quebec when an army of 35,000 Canadian volunteers were mob-ilized, and in Juarez when Villa's denounced. He saw the operations of the Mexican General in rushing his troops to Chihuahua, where he re-viewed 40,000.

Colonel Hammond says Juarez is a
