**Motor Truck Makers to Get Order for 1000 Machines.**

**ITALY BUYING AEROPLANES**

**Agent Comes With Commission to Purchase Aircraft and High-Power Motors—Government Already Owns Many.**

**SOUTH BETHLEHEM, Pa., Oct. 1.**—Thirty-seven representatives of American motor truck manufacturers who have been demonstrating their trucks here for several weeks were informed today by E. C. Grace, president of the Bethlehem Steel Company, that recommendations for the types of 1914 trucks wanted by France and Russia for use in the present war have been made by a committee of French army officers now in South Bethlehem, but the contracts would not be awarded today.  
The Bethlehem Steel Company, it was learned here, is the purchasing agent for Russia and France for motor trucks and army supplies, such as shoes, blankets and horsehoes.  
**NEW YORK, Oct. 1.**—With a commission from the Italian government to purchase aeroplanes and motors of high power, Ines Bossi, Italian agent for an American aeroplane manufacturer, was a passenger on the Tomasso di Savoia, which reached New York today.  
The Italian government now has 17 dirigibles, two of which are as big as Zeppelins; 280 biplanes and 70 hydroplanes, Mr. Bossi said. "Seven of the hydroplanes are equipped to launch torpedoes. At the outbreak of the war I turned over to the government several flying machines, one of which was of 400 horsepower, designed for a trans-Atlantic test."

## FOOD ISSUE GRAVE

**Price of Corn Increasing Rapidly in Austria.**

**ITALY RESTRICTS EXPORT**

**Embargo by Roumania Causes Consternation—Military Movements Disarrange Plans for Renewing Supply in Brussels.**

**LONDON, Oct. 1.**—The food question is a grave one in Austria, according to a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Chisasso, Switzerland. The Austrian Emperor has issued an edict empowering the government to take all measures necessary to alleviate the situation. The price of corn is double that of normal times and is increasing at the rate of 3 per cent daily.  
German and Austrian dealers are traveling in neutral countries, the dispatch says, trying to buy corn and announcing at the same time that it is intended for other countries. Italy has demanded that the fullest guarantees be given that corn purchased there is not to go to Austria.  
Roumania's embargo on the export of corn has caused consternation in Austria, according to the dispatch, and it is said that Austria is now making desperate efforts to get wheat from the United States, but the blockade of the Adriatic makes relief from this quarter doubtful. The shortage of food is also felt in the German army, the dispatch declares.  
Hugh E. Gibson, secretary of the American Legation at Brussels, has just arrived in London. He says that Brussels is quiet, but the food supply is becoming low. The Germans permitted arrangements to bring food from Antwerp to Brussels, but as the supplies were about to be shipped, military movements disarranged railway transportation, making the moving of freight impossible.

## JUDGE GARY QUILTS POSTS

**Steel Corporation Head Says He Is Out of Interlocking Directorates.**

**JUDGE GARY QUILTS POSTS**

**NEW YORK, Oct. 1.**—Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel Corporation, announced today that he had resigned as director from all companies with which he had been previously connected except where these companies were affiliated with the corporation.

Judge Gary's withdrawal from outside corporations is in line with the attitude known to prevail among certain business men that, inasmuch as the Administration looks with disfavor on interlocking directorates, they should do their share where possible toward abolishing them.  
The last company from which Judge Gary resigned as a director was the Southern Railway. Previously to that he had resigned directorships in 12 other corporations during the past 12 months.  
Judge Gary himself later explained his resignation by declaring: "It was because there seems to be a growing public sentiment against interlocking directorates."

## IRISH FIGHT DUE TO POLICE

**Employment of Arms Against Nationalists Held Unlawful.**

**LONDON, Oct. 1.**—The Royal Commission appointed to inquire into the events of July 26 last, when four persons were killed and many wounded in Dublin during a fight with the police and soldiers, following the landing of guns by Nationalist volunteers at Howth, nine miles from Dublin, today reported that the employment of the police and military was not in accordance with the law.  
The report further says that Assistant Commissioner of Police Farrell was responsible for the calling out of the military and for the orders issued to the police.  
The Nationalist volunteers landed the arms at Howth at noon on July 26. The police were warned of the landing and, reinforced by a detachment of the King's Own Scottish Borderers, intercepted the gun runners at Clontarf.

## REPUBLICAN "ANTI" QUILTS

**Fred C. Tanner Heads New York Organization, Mills Stepping Out.**

**NEW YORK, Oct. 1.**—At the request of District Attorney Whitman today, Ogden D. Mills, avowed "anti-organization" candidate for the chairmanship of the Republican State Committee, withdrew from the race, and Fred C. Tanner, campaign manager for Mr. Whitman in his primary campaign for Governor, was selected unanimously to succeed William Barnes, whose term as chairman expired automatically at noon today. He was not a candidate for re-election and did not attend the meeting.

Mr. Mills declared he was withdrawing solely because Mr. Whitman had requested him to quit the race "in the interest of harmony." He added that he would support whoever was chosen as chairman.
