

Based on registration returns from the various counties of the state, supplemented by reports of Republican unity in every voting precinct, Charles unity in every voting precinct, Charles B. Moores, Republican state chairman, yesterday completed an analysis of the "strength" possessed by George E. Chamberlain, Democratic candidate for re-election to the United States Senate. His inevitable conclusion is that the state, which has a Republican majority of approximately 75,000, is certain to elect R. A.
