FEDERAL SUIT SEPARATE

PRIVATE ACTION DOES NOT AFFECT LAND GRANT CASE.

Decision Against 113 Plaintiffs in Litigation Independent From Demand for Forfeiture.

The decision handed down by the United States Court of Appeals in San Francisco Monday holding groundless the suit filed by 113 plaintiffs seeking to dispossess the Southern Oregon Land Company of 105,120 acres of land in the Coos Bay and Roseburg district has no particular effect on the Federal suit pending in Oregon, except that the same lands are involved.

Testimony in the Government suit is being taken at Coos Bay and Roseburg by special Assistant Attorney General Constantin J. Smith and Frederick C. Raab before Miss Vivian Fleckenstein, a shorthand expert appointed by the court to transcribe the testimony and submit it at the final hearing in Portland when the arguments of the attorneys will be heard.

The San Francisco court refused to pass upon the question as to whether or not the Southern Oregon Land Company is the rightful owner of the tract involved, leaving that matter for the United States District Court of Oregon to decide at the pending trial.

The tract affected was originally granted to the State of Oregon in 1869 by a special act of Congress providing a military road be constructed from Coos Bay to Roseburg.
