

CHINESE PROTEST BUT WON'T FIGHT

Ultimatum - Like Declaration Follows Japanese Seizure of Railway Stations.

FEELING IN PEKIN STRONG

American Missionary at Wei-Hsien, However, Says Invaders Went on Their Way Without Molesting Population.

PEKIN, Oct. 8.—The government has been informed that a party of 30 Japanese Wednesday occupied the stations of the Shan-Tung Railway at Taiain, the western terminus of the German-owned railway. The foreign office immediately on receipt of this intelligence delivered another protest to the Japanese Legation, demanding the withdrawal of the Japanese troops and asking for a reply.

However, despite the ultimatum-like character of the Chinese note, it is admitted that China does not intend to fight. Also at the solicitation of the government, which feared that otherwise the situation with Japan would be further complicated, the Germans have not fulfilled their threat to dynamite the bridge.

Feeling Against Japan Intense. The feeling here against the Japanese is becoming intense. The papers publish accounts of their alleged misbehavior with characteristic exaggeration. For example, a petition from the citizens of Wei-Hsien says: "The Japanese arrived here three days ago, since the military were retained by the people is beyond description. The actual number there has not yet been ascertained, but the streets and lanes are crowded with these dwarfs."

An American missionary, acting as a correspondent at Wei-Hsien, telegraphs that a total of 300 Japanese had arrived there by the third day of occupation and that on the fourth all but 30 of the soldiers proceeded westward without having molested the people, although the inhabitants are much in fear of both the Japanese and Chinese troops.

Missionaries Say Wronged as Few. From other missionaries and correspondents come reports of such cases of wrongdoing as might be expected in a few in an army of 30,000 strong. The trouble usually results from the Japanese system of billeting on the natives and drawing on them for common requirements.

GUNBOATS BELIEVED SUNK. Tokio Believes Two Germans Besides Kormoran Destroyed.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—The East and West News Bureau tonight announced that it had received a cable message from Tokio as follows: "The Japanese War Department issues the following official statement: "After examining the reports received from various sources, it is inferred that three German gunboats, the Bay of Kiau-Chau, the Bay of Kiau-Chau, and the Bay of Kiau-Chau, were sunk on October 6 and 7, 1914, by a Japanese submarine in the night advance along the Shan-Tung Railway as far as Chi-Nan. There about 30 locomotives, in addition to some 700 passenger and freight cars, fell into the hands of the Japanese soldiers."

PARIS, Oct. 8.—The automobile of M. Wedel-Jarlsberg, the Norwegian Minister to France, was struck by fragments of a shell in the course of a visit of the Minister to the front line. The chauffeur was killed and the machine disabled. M. Wedel-Jarlsberg escaped injury, but was obliged to walk some distance under a shell fire.

WOMAN KILLS HER LODGER. Mrs. Barbara Lukosky Shoots Man She Believed Intruder.

SEATTLE, Oct. 8.—Becoming alarmed when she received no response when she asked the identity of a man who was rapping violently on the door, Mrs. Barbara Lukosky, 29 years old, fired a pistol through the door and killed Anton Budavilas, a meat cutter who had lodgings at her house.

SUNDAY WORK IS SCORED. Methodists Say Hotels, Etc., Should Close.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 8.—Activities of business and pleasure on Sunday were deprecated by the Methodist general conference at its closing session today. Hotels, restaurants and drug stores should not do business on the Sabbath, the conference felt, and golf, social teas and traveling should be frowned on.

GERMAN IS OPTIMISTIC

CONSUL-GENERAL AT SAN FRANCISCO FEELS HAPPINESS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 8.—In a letter received by the consul-general of the German consulate here, Franz Bopp, Consul-General for Germany in San Francisco, at present on a visit to the city, reports a thoroughly optimistic view of the situation in Germany as expressed by "I consider myself happy in being here in these great times," wrote Mr. Bopp. "You people in America have probably been served with a lot of false news by English and French cables. Well, you'll remember that in 1870 the French played the same game, announcing victories when they were beaten."
