Paul Cudlipp, a former member of the Lincoln High, was responsible for the perfect pass which went into Lewis' arms and tied the score, and, to make things more complete. Cudlipp kicked the goal which not only won the game, but sent the followers of the private school eleven into the wildest hilarity.

Freeman punted and Frank Busch recovered the ball after it had been fumbled by the academy.


