Deftly she twists this into a cone, pins it at exactly the proper angle, and clips the point with a pair of sharp selssors. For each different blossom there is a different clip.

The pink icing, or purple or blue or yellow, or whatever color is to be used for the flowers, is put into one cone and the green for the leaves and stems is put into another. Then with her fingers she manipulates the cone in such a manner that the icing takes the desired form. Such cakes will be given away each day next week at The Oregonian Home Economics School.
