Old Heilig Chosen for Candidate's Answer to Charges Made by Governor.

CHAIRMAN HANDLE DETAILS

Conditions for Argument Are Met and Party Representatives Work

Out Final Terms—Report to Be in the Oregonian.

Whether or not Governor West accepts the challenge of Robert A. Booth, Republican Senator, to debate with him the subject of Mr. Booth's qualifications for the Senatorship, Mr. Booth will appear at the old Heilig Theater, Eleventh and Morrison streets, at 7:30 o'clock next Friday evening to answer the various charges that the Governor already has made against him. However, it is probable that the Governor will not appear at the time appointed in the Republican candidate's original invitation to debate. Mr. Booth and Governor West have a lengthy conversation over the telephone yesterday and virtually agreed upon the terms.

THE OREGONIAN TO PRINT DEBATE.

Conditions Are Met.

Mr. Booth's letter to the Governor follows: "Your letter of the 19th in response to mine of the 15th reached me at this office at 9:15 o'clock this morning. I immediately upon receipt of it called you on the telephone for the purpose of saying that my memory is not available for our proposed meeting and suggested that all arrangements and agreements governing the meeting be left to the discretion of the Governor. I suggested Mr. Moore, chairman of the Republican state central committee, and Mr. Haney, chairman of the Democratic state central committee, to be present at our meeting, and that I assented and have since been in conference with these gentlemen.
