

GRAHAM HOPEFUL FOR SACRAMENTO

Representative of Minority Stockholders Says Business Men Back Him.

CAL EWING IS RECEPTIVE

Owner of Seals Says He and Partner Will Not Sell Unless Assured Club Conducted on Right Plan.

San Francisco, Oct. 28.—(Special.)—With the Coast League annual session a thing of the past, the magnates who had been called to San Francisco for this important gathering were scattering today.

Judge McCredie, of Portland, was in a hurry to return home and lost no time in taking his departure. Charlie Graham, representing minority stockholders of the Mission club, was on deck today, but took the train tonight for Sacramento.

Hogan was gathering up odds and ends, but will leave tomorrow afternoon at the latest.

With the exception of the committee named to dispose of the Mission franchise, said committee consisting of Cal Ewing, Frank Leavitt and A. T. Baum, there remains no unfinished business.

Just when this committee will get down to action is under discussion. Members of the committee declare that they will await the outside propositions from cities that would like to be taken over.

It is considered likely something will be done before the league executive leaves for the meeting of the minor leagues in Omaha on November 19.

Graham Yet Hopeful. Charlie Graham declared he was still hopeful he would be able to bring about successful negotiations to cause the return of the team to Sacramento.

"The business men want the team there, and I think we will be able to arrange the matter," he said. According to Cal Ewing, nothing more than tentative propositions have been submitted to himself and his business partner, Frank M. Leavitt, for the sale of the San Francisco baseball club.

"We are in a receptive mood," he declared, "and have been for some time. However, we will not sell unless we are assured the club will fall into the hands of the right men to conduct baseball on the right plan."

Hogan Not Bigger. Hap Hogan denied today that he was a bidder for the San Francisco franchise and expressed his satisfaction to remain where he is. It is understood that Tom Stephens, of San Jose, would like to get the club if it can be arranged for him. Hogan and Leavitt will find a way of retiring after the sport.

The suggested deal for the transfer of Roy Corban to the Philadelphia Nationals is hanging fire. Scout Billy Neal, while he admits he would like to have Corban, has far refused to place a price on the Albuquerque altista farmer, and indicates that he wants to talk trade. Ewing prefers a monetary question to be left to the club, but he would like to see the deal made by the owner.

He offered Frazer another match a few months later, but Billy forfeited. McAuliffe had a close call in 1887 when he fought Jim Carney, an English brawler, at Rexford, Ore. In that fight he was defeated by a knock-out in the 74 rounds, and was called a draw, but Carney had the best of it when the ring was broken into by a gang of roughs. Jack's first big fight was in 1888, at North Judson, Ind., when he fought 44 rounds to a draw with Billy Meyers. The "Streator Cyclone," McAuliffe's arch enemy, had this occasion, and in 1892 he easily whipped Myer in New Orleans. McAuliffe retired from the ring, undefeated, in 1898, having held the title 3 years.

Noted French Fugitive Suffers in War by Punctured Lung. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 28.—According to a letter received here by Joseph Selby, wife of the fugitive, "Kid" McCoy, from a friend in Paris, France has lost four noted boxers, the European war, and a fifth probably is fatally wounded. Those thought to have been killed are Charles Ledoux, Charles Struber, Edouard Haguen and Max Stine. Ledoux is known in this country, having fought at Los Angeles.
