Valley Delegations Are Daily Feature of Exposition in Progress at Armory.

REALTY BOARD HAS PART

Elks Also Assist in Providing Entertainment—Old Fashioned Baby Show and Manufacturers' Night Are Saturday.

PROGRAMME FOR TODAY AT MANUFACTURERS' AND LAND PRODUCTS SHOW.

Afternoon, 1-6 P. M.—Old-fashioned baby show, under auspices of Women of Woodcraft, features at the show.

Out-of-town visitors in organized delegations are becoming a daily feature of the programmes at the Manufacturers and Land Products Show as a result of the recent tour of the valley by representatives of the railway companies to interest commercial organizations in sending crowds to the exposition.

Hillsboro will send more than 200 persons to the show November 10. A committee from the Hillsboro Booster Club, consisting of Sam Well, G. C. Combs, E. L. Moore and G. V. Payne, visited the exposition to make arrangements for the programme to be given in the free theater the afternoon of Hillsboro's day.

The Portland Realty Board and the Elks played a big part in the special entertainment features at the show. The Realty Board paraded at noon through the streets en route for the Armory, led by Campbell's band.

On the march through the streets and after their arrival at the show the men gave songs and yells celebrating the show in all of its phases.

The canning contest which began Thursday, attracted a great deal of interest and the final demonstrations today are expected to draw big crowds.

They are intended to be illustrative of the School Girls' Industrial Club work, being presented in Oregon by the United States Department of Agriculture and various local agencies.

These club workers in competition for liberal prizes are canning beans, corn, apples, fish, meats and similar foodstuffs which the average wife does not undertake to "put up" for winter use.

Features of the show today will be the "manufacturers' night" and the old-fashioned baby show.
