WHEAT SHOWS BIG GAIN

Shipments During Last 3 Months Heavier Than for Any Previous Corresponding Period-Beef Increases 11 Times.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20,-War's demand on American granaries, mills and packing-houses, as shown today in and packing-houses, as shown today in an analysis by the Department of Com-merce, resulted in record exportations of breadstuffs, meats and other food articles during September. Many trade currents, broken by the European up-heaval, have shifted to the United States, France demanding immense quantities of fresh beef, South Amer-ica and Europe buying large amounts of flour, while nearly all the markets formerly supplied from other sources are importing millions of pounds of American sugar.
