WOMAN'S DEATH LAID TO FUGITIVE.—Holding that Mrs. Olympia Parlin came to her death as a result of gun shot wounds and knife wounds inflicted Saturday by Roman Padgin, the Coroner's jury at an inquest yesterday recommended in its verdict the detainer of Padgin. Mrs. Parlin died Tuesday, after lying at the point of death in St. Vincent's Hospital since Saturday. Padgin escaped and is being hunted with bloodhounds. He attempted to enter Mrs. Parlin's home near Grays Crossing, Mount Scott. It is said, "Psychology Club Circles Forum." JURY AWARDS \$2500 FOR LOSS OF LEG.—The jury in Judge Morrow's court that heard the trial of the suit brought by Jack Johnson against the Chapman Timber Company, Jack Johnson and the Nehalem Timber Company for \$24,250 damages because of the loss of a leg while the plaintiff was employed in logging camp operations near Capeoose returned a verdict yesterday awarding \$2500 to the plaintiff.

J. W. MILLINGTON IS DEAD.—John W. Millington, 70 years old, a Civil War veteran and who assisted in the capture of John Wilkes Booth, slayer of Abraham Lincoln, died of cancer yesterday at the home of his son, Joseph E. Millington, 570 Sumner street. Mr. Millington is survived by a widow and three sons, John W., of this city; George K., of this city, and James W. Millington, of Vancouver, Wash. The family came to Portland 12 years ago. Mr. Millington was born in New York. Funeral services will be held at Holman's chapel Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interment will be in the Grand Army of the Republic Cemetery.

INHERITANCE TAXES DUE.—Agnes H. Rowe, widow of the late H. S. Rowe, formerly Mayor of Portland, must pay an inheritance tax to the state of \$470.91, according to a statement filed yesterday in the Probate Court. Mrs. Rowe died, March 21, 1914, her estate was appraised at \$24,422 and practically all is left to the widow. Inheritance taxes have been assessed against the estate of the late Daniel Kunkel, who died January 17 last, leaving property valued at \$108,886. The widow, Anna, was bequeathed \$8333 and pays an inheritance tax of \$48.33, while a brother, Samuel Kunkel, who lives in Germany, was willed \$77,664 and will pay a tax of \$726.65.

JACKSON ESTATE LEFT TO WIDOW.—Probate of the will of the late Rhee Jackson, son of Colonel James Jackson, of this city, a captain in the United States Army, whose death occurred September 21 in Laredo, Texas, is asked in a petition filed yesterday by Richard W. Montague, named in the will as executor of the estate. The value of the property belonging to Captain Jackson at the time of his death is stated to be \$3500, which is being held by the executor, Elizabeth Van Emad Jackson, whose home is in New York City, and to a daughter, aged 4 years, Mary Elizabeth Jackson. The will was executed in January, 1910.

TROUDDALE OFFICER RETAINED.—Upon request of Sheriff Word, the County Commissioners yesterday made an order continuing Deputy Sheriff Monahan's employment as a peace officer at Troutdale, where he has been temporarily employed during the Summer, until December 31. It was stated that the deputy has effected the capture of two highwaymen while he was on duty and that his improved conditions there as regards the trap nuisance.

R. W. MARTIN IS BURIED.—Raleigh W. Martin died at his home at Rockwood on the Bayview road Saturday of wounds received by the discharge of a shotgun while he was hunting in the woods on the Bayview road. He was son of Mr. and Mrs. N. J. Martin, and was born at Eugene, Or., March 12, 1891. Besides his parents, he is survived by three sisters and two brothers, Mrs. George Brent, of Eugene; Mrs. O. J. Smith, Rainier; Miss Oia E. Martin, Edward and Richard Martin. Burial was held yesterday afternoon from the family residence at Rockwood and the interment was made in Rose City Cemetery.
