Several members of the police expect to find Traunson in a mentally unbainanced condition wandering somewhere about Portland. Others in the department would not be surprised to find him a victim of a bullet fired by his own hands. The fact that Traunson probably did not have any considerable sum of money with him leads the police to believe that hunger will drive him to the open soch, if he is the slayer.

Traunson had an hour's start of the police, but the fact that the murder was ostensibly a premeditated act, nursed by a wounded affection, lead the police now to think he may have prepared for an escape. But so thor-Suicide Theory Bronched.

"We, the jury, find that Emma Ulrich came to her death from a gunshot wound in the head inflicted at her home at 1047 Corbett street, on the night of November 16, from a revolver in the hands of persons unknown to this jury. It is the belief, from evidence which has come to our attention, that Emma Ulrich came to her death at the hands of Fred Traunson."
