# MILL EXTENSIONS FINISHED

## O.-W. R. & N. Dock Being Used and

Is Nearly All Enclosed.

Trestles on the harbor line that ad-join the plant of the Portland Flouring Mills Company and extend north and south of that structure have been completed and on the north side a stairway has been built leading to a float that rises and falls with the stage of water, so it is always avail-able for launches. The convenience is the only one of the kind at any dock on the river, though a few have ladders and some of those are unhandy and unsafe.

The new O.-W. R. & N. dock south t there is partly enclosed and is being used for transferring river freight. while a large force is working on the roof and corrugated iron sides, so that in another week the entire structure will be protected from the weather, Other private docks and trestles along the waterfront are about finished and headway is being made on Municipal Docks No. 1 and No. 2.
